The Light by the Lake

When my father told us that he had been promoted, everyone looked proud. He smiled, but I could not. His new job meant that our family had to leave the city and move to a small town where evenings were too quiet. I was sixteen, and moving was not my thing.

On my first day at school, I felt as if everyone knew me. Students looked at me before I introduced myself. Some smiled, while others whispered my name. A small town, I thought, did not need the Internet because stories **spread like wildfire**. While looking for my classroom, I saw a boy near a noticeboard. He placed a cream-coloured card in my hand.

The boy was about my age, with neat hair, pale skin and an old shirt buttoned to the neck. His name was James. His smile was gentle, but his eyes looked lonely. On the card were only an address and the words, "Come when the sun is low." That evening, my mother thought it was a kind welcome, while my father reminded me to stay alert.

The next day, I forced myself to be brave and followed the address. Soon, I reached a lake that reflected the orange sky. Beside it stood a beautiful house from an old storybook. Its cream walls glowed, golden lamps shone through tall windows, and white flowers climbed along the balcony.

At the front door, a butler in a dark suit welcomed me. James was waiting inside. His hand felt cold, but his voice was warm. The hall smelled of roses and wood. Guests moved quietly around the room. Nobody looked at a phone or asked why I had come alone.

James stayed near me most of the evening. He asked about my old school, my family and whether I missed the city. He listened carefully, but sometimes stared at the lake as if waiting for someone. Before I left, the butler handed me heavy paper bags, so I imagined expensive gifts inside.

At home, my excitement turned sour. The boxes were filled with dry leaves, black stones and burnt wood. My mother turned pale, and my father threw everything away. The next morning, I told Elise, my classmate. She did not laugh and brought me to her house after school.

Elise's mother froze when she saw the card. She had received the invitation years earlier, but had been too frightened to go. Elise's father, whose family had lived there for generations, told us about the rich family who owned the house by the lake and welcomed newcomers with parties.

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One evening, their beautiful daughter was found drowned in the lake. On the same night, James, her only brother, disappeared. People believed James had caused his sister's death and run away. A few days later, the house caught fire and destroyed much of the evidence. After that, the family left, and nobody asked about James again.

The story explained the strange gifts. Elise and I checked the place again before sunset. This time, the house was gone. Only broken walls, wild grass and damp earth remained. Rain started pouring, so we turned back. As we were leaving, a pale light rose from the lake and fell on a shabby wall.

Something pulled me towards it. When I pressed my hand against the wet bricks, they collapsed. Behind them stood James in the same clothes, but only his skeleton remained. There was a crack on his skull. The town was shocked. James had not run away. Someone had hurt him, hidden him behind the wall and allowed everyone to blame him.

The light from the lake must have come from James's sister, as if she wanted the truth to be found. My parents wanted to move again, but my father's job made it impossible. I told myself I only had to wait until college. The town did not feel empty anymore. I met kinder people and spent peaceful evenings by the lake.

I learnt an important lesson. A new place may seem strange at first, but every place has its own stories. We should listen, observe and understand before we judge. I hope the siblings have found peace now.

Beauty is Only Skin Deep

Beauty can mean different things in different places. In South Korea, many beauty trends come from K-pop, Korean dramas, skincare products and fashion. Many young people admire the clear skin, slim faces and stylish clothes of Korean stars. Advertisements and social media often show the same perfect look again and again. Korean beauty trends are also popular among Malaysian teenagers. Some students enjoy Korean skincare, hairstyles or fashion ideas. (31) They can choose what suits their age, school rules and personal comfort. Trends may change quickly, but good values stay with us.
